

SEIS Celebrates Student Achievement

On January 26, 2024, SEIS held two end-of-the-marking-period spotlight assemblies in the cafeteria. Staff and students gathered by grade level for these assemblies. SEIS has held spotlight assemblies for 11 years.

The main focus of these assemblies is to hand out awards to students. Mr. Horton, the SEIS principal, stated that the purpose of the awards is, "to support success academically and behaviorally, and to acknowledge that not everything is negative. A lot of the time, schools are seen as negative, and we try to be positive when students have been doing what they are doing, especially with our character traits."

Mrs. Curry, the SEIS counselor, stated that the positive effects of the awards are to give, "students ownership to really show the places that they shine and also to acknowledge the students in

their class that they are doing well in. Another thing that I really like we do is that the students get to select the winners of the student of the marking period." She also stated that, "the teachers really do try to acknowledge as many students as they can. That's also why we try to do awards for attendance and why we also try to do things for students who don't have any points for those character traits so we have a way to celebrate them too."

The teachers have to take into consideration many factors to decide who gets awards. "The one thing I look at is grades and who has the highest in the class because I think they should be recognised for their hard work. Another award I like to give out is most improved because I think that is another one the students should be proud of, improving a whole letter grade." said Mrs. Alt.

Achievement: Awards Given to Students



Brandon Hilferding Shows Rabbits

Brandon Hilferding from Mr. Brenneman’s homeroom has a hobby of showing rabbits. Showing rabbits means that Brandon raises specific breeds of rabbits, grooms them, trains them, and then enters them in competitions where they are judged. He’s been showing rabbits since he was 4 years old.

Brandon learned about showing rabbits from YouTube videos and a rabbit club.

He said he’s shown rabbits in “many places. I’ve gone to Kentucky for the national rabbit show, I went to Lebanon, I went to the state farm fair, and many other places.”

According to Brandon he has a “bunch of different breeds,” of rabbits including the Netherland dwarf, mini-rex, rex, Holland lop, mini-lop, and lionheads.

The rabbits live in a large enclosure outside that can hold over 30 rabbit cages.

It’s a daily chore to care for the rabbits. Brandon gives them hay and feed. His brother is responsible for giving them water. To prepare them for shows, the rabbits must be groomed including brushing their fur and taking care of their teeth and nails.

Brandon has won multiple awards including the “Best of Breed” award which is given to the best example of a particular kind of rabbit.

The teachers usually have all the supplies they need, but Mr. Horton can give them budget money for whatever they don't have.


